## ... Holiday Parade ...

The club has just finished assisting with the 55th Annual Massillon Holiday Parade which brings to a close the MARC public service season. We had another great parade with terrific club participation. This continues to remain the oldest public service event that is handled by the club and our responsibilities have grown over recent years to include many aspects of parade operation. The parade was rebroadcast over Massillon Cable TV and I hope some of you had a chance to view it. The club trailer looked great on the route and special thanks to Jim – WA8GXM for pulling the trailer in the parade.

In the early years of the parade, we provided only communications support to the Massillon JC's organization who handled the staging of all the parade units. When they disbanded, the city struggled to find volunteers willing to take on this task. Since the MARC handled communications support, somehow we got nominated to take on this responsibility as well. A few years later, Massillon Cable began filming the parade in conjunction with the Massillon High School Communications Department and again the club was called upon to assist with this part of the parade also. Last minute omissions or changes to the parade line up are passed on to the production crew so that the announcers can follow along with the parade units. We had experience with this as well as amateurs routinely handle staging activities including TV production control relay duties at the Hall of Fame Festival Kick-off Parade. The Holiday Parade has depended on this ever since.

Over the past several years the parade has been sponsored by the Downtown Merchants Association with President Donald Harwig serving as Parade Chairman. During this time and before the club has always been there to make sure the parade is properly staged and starts on time down the parade route. We have become an integral part of the parade and I wonder if they could pull it off without us.

I'm glad to report another successful public service event with very few problems thanks to our communications and parade skills. Over 42 years and counting Santa has arrived in the city in no small part thanks to the MARC. A special note regarding this year's parade, Santa rode in his traditional sleigh instead of a Massillon FD fire truck. Just the way it was many years ago.

The ARRL has posted the official results from this year's Field Day and the club's final score was 3,282 points on 765 QSO's placing us 132nd in the US in Class 2A. It was left to a few of our diehard operators to handle all of the operating. This is a lot of work that's left to only a few members in recent years. Maybe it's time to think about scaling back our Field Day effort if we can't get more members to participate. Something to ponder and discuss as we plan our 2009 club season.

Marcradio.org has continued to be a busy place again this year with over 5,000 visits during 2009. Maintaining the site continues to be a labor of love with emphasis on the labor requiring several hours per week adding new material, removing old, archiving the stories we want to keep and general upkeep. Several enhancements were added throughout the year including a new Google Search Engine and a new YouTube video section. Additionally some slight programming changes were made to enhance the sites appearance for you Mozilla Firefox browser fans out there which did seem to help. The following message comes from Mr. Steve Katz, N8WL - Ohio Assistant Section Manager (Central Ohio), and Project Lead for Ohio PRB-1:

## ARRL NEWS

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To all Ohio ARRL members:

We are at a critical point in the effort to pass PRB-1 legislation and we need your collective help.

There is a House Bill, H.B.-212, <http://www.legislature.state.oh.us/bills.cfm?ID=128> **HB 212**

that was introduced some time ago and contains the exact wording we suggested in order to prevent local zoning authorities from undermining PRB-1, a 1984 FCC regulation that is Federal law and requires local governments to afford reasonable accommodation for Amateur Radio antennas so that hams could communicate effectively.

Unfortunately, obscure Federal laws are often ignored by local zoning authorities; thus 27 states have so far enacted laws similar to PRB-1 to ensure the availability of emergency communications as a local resource.

Now we are attempting to introduce a companion bill in the Ohio's state senate with the same wording, but it needs to be introduced with Senate co-sponsors on board. We need for each of you to take a few minutes of time to email or call your state senator, and ask him or her to contact Senator Tim Shaffer and co-sponsor "the amateur radio legislation being introduced by Senators Shaffer and Sawyer." The bill doesn't have a number assigned yet, so refer to it as in those quotation marks. The bill will likely be introduced next week with the co-sponsors that have signed on before it is introduced, so our time is limited.

Please look up your state senator, if you do not know who he or she is at <http://www.ohiosenate.gov/> and click on Find Your Senator. Because of the urgency of this request, do not write letters; phone calls and email will be faster.

Incorporate the following key points into your email or your conversation with the senator (or more likely the

senator's staffer).

1. Amateur ("ham") Radio is both a flourishing technical hobby and a critically important public service in times of disaster (9/11, Katrina, Rita, Ike, countless floods, tornadoes, blizzards, earthquakes, tsunamis, and many others). It has been proven time and again that when power is out, phone lines are down, and cell phone systems are overloaded, Amateur Radio is the only way that emergency messages get through.
2. In Ohio, hams were active in the blizzard of '78, the Van Wert tornado and others, many floods, and countless local incidents. When trouble strikes, ham radio operators are ready! Hams establish relationships with "served agencies" (Emergency Management Agency, Red Cross, Salvation Army, etc.) to work with them and practice for emergencies. [Note: Amateur Radio is not the same as CB (Citizen's Band), an unregulated service used mostly by truckers.]
3. To be effective, Amateur Radio operators need outdoor antenna structures. In the past, local zoning authorities have passed ordinances that severely restricted such structures and impaired Amateur Radio operation, so in 1984 the Federal Communications Commission made a ruling PRB-1 (now Federal Law) that requires local governments to afford reasonable accommodation for Amateur Radio antennas so that hams can communicate effectively.
4. Unfortunately, obscure Federal laws are often ignored by overzealous local zoning authorities; thus 27 states have so far enacted state laws similar to PRB-1 to ensure the availability of emergency communications as a local resource when needed for homeland security.
5. The bill is bipartisan and affects around 27,000 licensed amateur radio operators in Ohio. Our effort is strictly grass roots, with no paid lobbyists.
6. The bill does not cost Ohio or any of its citizens any money. Amateur Radio operators are unpaid volunteers in time of communications emergency. They donate their own time and they use their own equipment without cost to the government. In addition, hams spend thousands of hours each year in preparing for emergency communications.
7. Ohio amateur radio operators need this protection in

order to fulfill their obligation to provide assistance with homeland security. No one should be opposed to this legislation. Interference from ham radio is no longer the issue that it once was. Antennas were once viewed as unsightly and may have adversely affected neighboring home values, but since 9/11 neighbors now appreciate close access to emergency communications.

\* \* \*

Please note that this legislation does not relate to other pending legislation regarding mobile use of communications devices nor does it relate to homeowners associations and private contracts, covenants, and restrictions (CC&Rs).

Please don't put this task aside. Time is critical and the issue is important. If the senators see that there is support, they will push this legislation through. If the local hams don't let their senators know how important it is, the senate will let the issue die. We've worked hard to get the legislation this far. This push will get it to the senate for serious consideration. Thank you.

## COMMENT FROM JIM WEAVER K8JE ARRL GREAT LAKES DIVISION DIRECTOR FROM “WEAVERS WORDS”

Amateur Radio: An Emergency Communication Service?

FCC's statement that Amateur Radio is not an emergency communication service created furor among a number of amateurs. They heatedly insist Amateur Radio is an emergency communication service. I understand what they are saying, but I disagree with them. To call the great service we love and enjoy an EmComm service short changes it. Ham radio is much more than an EmComm service.

The basis and purpose of Amateur Radio as the FCC lists them in Part 97 are:

“97.1 Basis and purpose . . . fundamental purpose as expressed in the following principles:

“(a) Recognition and enhancement of the value of the amateur service to the public as a voluntary, non-commercial communications service particularly with respect in providing emergency communications.

“(b) Continuation and extension of the amateur's proven ability to contribute to the advancement of the radio art.

“(c) Encouragement and improvement of the amateur rules which provide for advancing skills in both the communication and technical phases of the art.

“(d) Expansion of the existing reservoir within the amateur radio service of trained operators, technicians, and electronics experts.

“(e) Continuation and extension of the amateur's unique ability to enhance international goodwill.”

Section 97.1 identifies four purposes for Amateur Radio. Only one of these relates to EmComm. By definition, Amateur Radio is more than an EmComm service. Realizing this fact does not detract from ham radio as an important provider of emergency communication support to the public.

It merely allows us to realize the broader value FCC places on our service.



## MORE ON PRB-1 (latest update)

Both the Michigan and Ohio Sections have PRB-1 bills in their respective state legislatures. The Michigan bill, Michigan HB 5556, and the Ohio bill, Ohio HB 212, need member support. To learn how you can help make Michigan and Ohio members of the growing group of states to adopt PRB-1 legislation, please contact the PRB-1 committee managers. These are PRB-1 Committee Project Manager Len Todd, N8AGS ([n8ags@arrl.net](mailto:n8ags@arrl.net)) and Ohio State Project Manager Steve Katz, N8WL ([n8wl@arrl.net](mailto:n8wl@arrl.net)).

A companion bill to Ohio HB 212 will be introduced into the Ohio Senate within a few days.

These bills are very passable. Work is needed to get this done. Over 50% of the states in the US have already passed similar bills. None of these bills add costs to local or state budgets. They simply will put the provisions of FCC PRB-1 into state law. Doing this will make it much more apparent to local governments it is illegal summarily to ban the amateur antenna structures or to exercise excessive control over their height. Passing the state "PRB-1" bills will put existing federal "law" into state law.

Please contact your Michigan and Ohio state legislators by mail, fax, e-mail, telephone or in person to ask them to support these bills.

### More from "Weavers Words - (I couldn't have said it better ED)

#### Operating Courtesy

Our ability to drive on streets and highways in reasonable safety depends on orderly driving practices by our fellow drivers and us. Our ability to conduct day-to-day business depends largely on basic honesty between other people and us. So too, our ability to operate and enjoy

Amateur Radio depends on mutual courtesy between our fellow amateurs and us.

To exist in harmony with each other, we need to respect the needs and rights of each other. When it comes to this, all that is needed is to observe the Golden Rule — Do unto others as you would have them do unto you.

It is unfortunate that too many hams overlook the Golden Rule. Instead they fail to observe good operating practices and FCC regulations when operating. This occurs most noticeably, but not totally, during contests and DX pileups.

I refer to the bad operating that occurs when in their

eagerness to compete, contesters or DXers thoughtlessly transmit on top of ongoing QSOs. Equally bad is when a member of a scheduled net or QSO acts as though the frequency belongs to them and barges into another QSO, contest or DX pileup to claim the frequency by brute force. Either situation represents poor operating practice — and maybe a flagrant rules violation.

There are gray areas associated with QRM. These gray areas often occur as propagation shifts. As this shift occurs, distant, previously-unheard stations may come into range . . . right on top of an ongoing QSO or net.

When propagation shift results in QRM, which station is at fault? Neither, probably. The situation is an act of the propagation gods. Yet, much of the time we hear one or both stations complain ad nauseum about the discourteous behavior of the other guy who suddenly started to QRM. Never mind that the other guy may have been on frequency for at least as long as the other operator.

A mature operating attitude is all that is needed to resolve coincidental QRM such as this. Someone probably should QSY.
