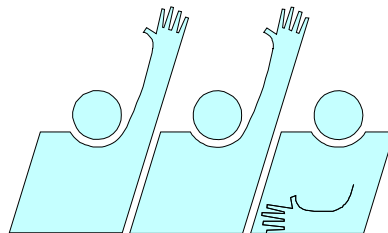

November 1, 2013

The Massillon Amateur Radio Club monthly meeting was held at the Massillon Senior Center on Friday, November 1, 2013 with 35 members and guests in attendance.

Mike WA8MKH called the meeting to order at 7:58 p.m., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and a round of introductions.

Don W8DEA, with a second by Jerry KC8BR, made a motion to accept the minutes as printed in November Feedback with the following amendment as specified by Mike WA8MKH: The 147.18 repeater shall be under PL control at all times, as voted during the October meeting. Motion Passed.

... FIELD DAY RESULTS ...

The ARRL has officially released the scores from this years Field Day exercise and as submitted the clubs final score was 3,572 points on 905 QSO's placing us 103rd in the US in Class 2A. A hearty congratulations to everyone involved in helping us achieve another great operating event. While our score slightly lower from the year before (by nearly 200 points), it was still a successful event and I know everyone had a great time. The Canton club again scored very well garnering 9,424 points on 2,240 QSO's. This placed them 9th in the US. Well done guy's.

Class 2A is a tough category to compete in. It always has the most entries with 440 this year. The Ohio Section also has the most participation with 130 scores submitted this year. We are in good company and we placed very well considering we are in the toughest category in the US !. It won't be long before we will begin planning for next years event, lets work together to make it another great club event !.

... HAMFEST REPORT ...

Our annual hamfest is over for another year and I'm happy to report that we had another successful club event. Table rentals were solid, attendance was strong and everyone I talked to continued to say what a nice hamfest we continue to sponsor each year. While I would have liked to have seen higher attendance, we have to realize we are a smaller size hamfest compared to other clubs. Table vendors reported decent sales which was good to hear. We even had some new parts vendors attend this year and they reported decent sales. I hope to invite them back next year.

... HOLIDAY PARADE ...

The club just finished assisting with the 59th Annual Massillon Holiday Parade sponsored by Massillon Main Street and the Downtown Massillon Association. This continues to remain the oldest public service event that is handled by the club and our responsibilities have grown over recent years to include many aspects of parade operation. The parade was rebroadcast over Massillon Cable TV and I hope some of you had a chance to view it. The club trailer looked great on the route with our new decorations and special thanks to Jim Farriss - WA8GXM for pulling the trailer in the parade.

In the early years of the parade, we provided only communications support to the Massillon JC's organization who handled the staging of all the parade units. When they disbanded, the city struggled to find volunteers willing to take on this task. Since the MARC handled communications support, somehow we got nominated to take on this responsibility as well.

A few years later, Massillon Cable began filming the parade in conjunction with the Massillon High School Communications Department and again the club was called upon to assist with this part of the parade also. Last minute omissions or changes to the parade line up are passed on to the production crew so that the announcers can follow along with the parade units. We had experience with this as well as amateurs routinely handle staging activities including TV production control relay duties at the Hall of Fame Festival Community Parade. The Holiday Parade has depended on this ever since.

Over the past several years the parade has been sponsored by the Downtown Merchants Association with President Donald Harwig serving as Parade Chairman. During this time and before the club has always been there to make sure the parade is properly staged and starts on time down the parade route. KB6NU COLUMN

Should the FCC allow encryption?

One of the most fundamental rules in amateur radio has been the prohibition against the use of codes or ciphers meant to obscure the meaning of a message [Part 97.113 (4)]. Recently, that long-standing prohibition was challenged (<http://www.arrl.org/news/rules-change-sought-to-permit-encryption-of-sensitive-emergency-communications>) to allow encryption when passing emergency health and welfare traffic. The idea was that encrypting these messages would protect the privacy of individuals. In his Petition for Rulemaking (<http://apps.fcc.gov/ecfs/document/view?id=7022424684>), Don Rolph, AB1PH, pointed out that Australian amateur radio rules permit encryption for emergency services operation or related training exercises.

Oddly enough, the pushback against this petition has been loud and swift. The ARRL quickly came out against the petition (<http://www.arrl.org/news/arrl-urges-denial-of-petition-to-permit-encryption-of-some-emergency-communications>), and when I blogged about this issue (<http://www.kb6nu.com/im-jumping-on-the-anti-encryption-bandwagon/>), several hams replied that they didn't think allowing encryption was a good idea.

The main arguments against encryption seem to be that:

- * It will make people suspicious of amateur radio operators and bring unwanted scrutiny upon amateur radio.
- * Make self-policing more difficult.

Among the arguments for allowing encryption are that cryptography is a fundamental element of modern RF communications, and that not allowing it, negates one of the purpose of amateur radio. Namely, that one of the purposes of amateur radio is to advance the state of the radio art.

In late September, the FCC dismissed this particular Petition for Rulemaking (<http://www.arrl.org/news/fcc-dismisses-encryption-petition>). It stated specifically that the record does not support Mr Rolph's assertion that the prohibition on encrypted amateur communications is impairing the ability of the Amateur Radio community to provide effective support to public safety agencies during emergencies.

Of course, this discussion isn't over yet. Encryption is now employed routinely for even the most common types of digital communication, and as a newer generation of amateur radio operators take over, they'll want to experiment with these digital communications techniques. One commenter suggested that a portion of the 900 MHz band or maybe the 5 GHz band be set aside for experimentation with encryption. I think that is an idea worth exploring.

What do you think? Does encryption have a place in amateur radio?

IN SYMPATHY

DR IGOR F NIKISHIN

Dr. Nikishin passed away on October 12, 2013 in Naples Florida at the age of 95 years. He was born on Christmas day in Charkov, Russia to Dr. Fedor and Maria Nikishin. In his early years he earned the designation of Eagle Scout of which he was very proud. He began his formal education in Czechoslovakia at the French Lyceum. His initial medical education was at the Czech Charles University in Prague and he continued at the German Charles University. He then furthered his education at the University of Göttingen in Germany. During World War II he was in the British Armed Forces serving as a physician. In 1949 Dr Nikishin, his wife and daughter (Nina) immigrated to the United States through Ellis Island and settled in Hagerstown Md. The family then moved to Canton Ohio after the Dr received an internship and residency at Aultman Hospital, he then became the Director of Surgery. Later in life he became Professor of Anatomy at North Ohio Universities, College of Medicine, now named Northeast Ohio Medical University. Dr. Nikishin enjoyed classical music. He played the piano and a guitar. He supported the Canton Symphony and he served as President of the Symphony Board of Directors. For a number of years he was the Choir Director of the St. Haralambos Greek Orthodox Church and at St. George Serbian Orthodox Church. During the sixties he was the team Physician at Canton South High School . He took many trips to Honduras, Haiti, and Alaska. Dr. Nikishin is survived by his wife Aysa of Naples Florida; his daughter Nina and her husband David of Brookfield Conn.; his son Michael Nikishin of Pittsburg Pa.; son Igor and Stephanie Nikishin of Canton, Oh. He is also survive by 9 Grandchildren He was preceded in death by Lydia Nikishin and their son, Alexander.

The Annual Christmas Parade.

HO HO HO....said the jolly fellow in the red suit.....

Another year, another good Public Service communications event for MARC. In fact, this is our most visible service of the year. Visible to the Parade entrants, for sure. Visible to the Parade watching public in the form of our decorated ECOM trailer.

This year we shifted frequency to our Affinity (Massillon) Hospital UHF repeater 442.85. In the past we have stayed with 2 meter simplex 145.62 since everyone has had 2 meter HTs for years. This year we figured that, since most hams today have a dual-band HT, we could revert to the closest repeater and have solid signals all the way. I did have some spare 70 cm HTs for those who did not have them.

Since our UHF repeater has generally been unused in recent years, and not having had a good routine maintenance session in that time, it was crucial that we pay a visit to the the "hard to get to" 4th floor elevator penthouse of the Hospital where it resides. After a good tune-up and resetting RX and TX frequencies, it was back to normal but without it's RF pre-amp. Since the preamp was zorched in past years by the high UHF RF levels atop the hospital, which are still there, it was decided to leave the preamp off until we can fabricate a sharp front-end filter for it. But, even without it, the sensitivity was almost 2uV, which would be adequate for HTs from 1/4 to 1 mile away.

In actuality it was solid for the most part, but some folks had marginal signals into it. Capt. Joe, WD8BGW, had problems inside the TV trailer downtown and had to retreat to open air to communicate. Some others may have had their HTs on their belts which tends to detune the "rubber dummies." But all in all, it was as good or better than our typical experience on 2M simplex. Sometime in the near future the 442.85 preamp will be reinstalled and operation will be much improved.

Now for the commentary....:-)

The Parade function is a little different than the normal ham volunteer effort. Normally if we are personally unable to volunteer for a

public service activity, it still goes on without us. In this case, our Parade involvement 45 years ago started from our initial work as "shadowers" of parade sponsors who put the parade together, since we had the radio capability. As sponsors died away (Jaycees and others) we offered to do the work ourselves since we already had the experience.

So now we are in the position of serious responsibility for the continuation of the parade. Without us it will not take place. If we were

paid employees doing this function, there would be no problem with staffing. But we are volunteers - and that's where we have to realize this activity is serious enough that we have a dedicated annual crew to call upon.

We have that now, to a degree, with the same folks doing their same job each year, making up about 40% of the crew. Next year we'll

start parade promotion sometime during the summer to avoid that "last minute rush!" ;-)

Of course we know that there will always be personal situations occurring that will cause some to miss. But getting substitutes will be much easier.

On the other extreme, if we don't do the job, who will? CBers? :-[(that ought to stir up the adrenalin... :-))

Have a good Christmas season, and may Santa compensate us by dropping some RF presents under our trees....
