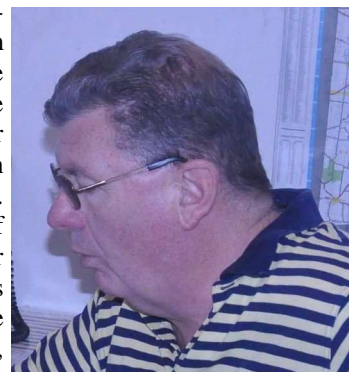

... PUBLIC SERVICE REPORT ...

As a coordinating member of the Stark County ARES, each year I prepare a general report of all our public service activities. The report includes a listing of all scheduled public service events and any emergency or drills we participate in over the course of the year. The report is distributed to local public service officials, our local Emergency Management Agency and both Ohio ARRL Section ARES Leadership and League Headquarters.

The complete report is currently posted on the Stark County ARES website but I thought you might enjoy reading a short highlight from the report.

During the year the Stark County ARES provided communications support for nine scheduled community service events and one unannounced Airport Drill. This totaled over 650 hours of service by 130 amateurs. This represented an increase of over 27% from 2011. The report also includes a breakdown of all the events by hours worked.

I encourage you to spend a few minutes reviewing this years report and realize just how active we are here in Stark County. I believe you will be impressed at the commitment spent by many amateurs here in the county.

... CLUB PROGRAMS PREVIEW ...

One of my responsibilities as your new Vice-President is to arrange for club programs. We have been very fortunate over the last several years to have many fine programs. A number of club members came through with some great ideas and even helped arrange for speakers on a wide range of topics.

- 18 Volunteer Examiners (some belong to multiple clubs)



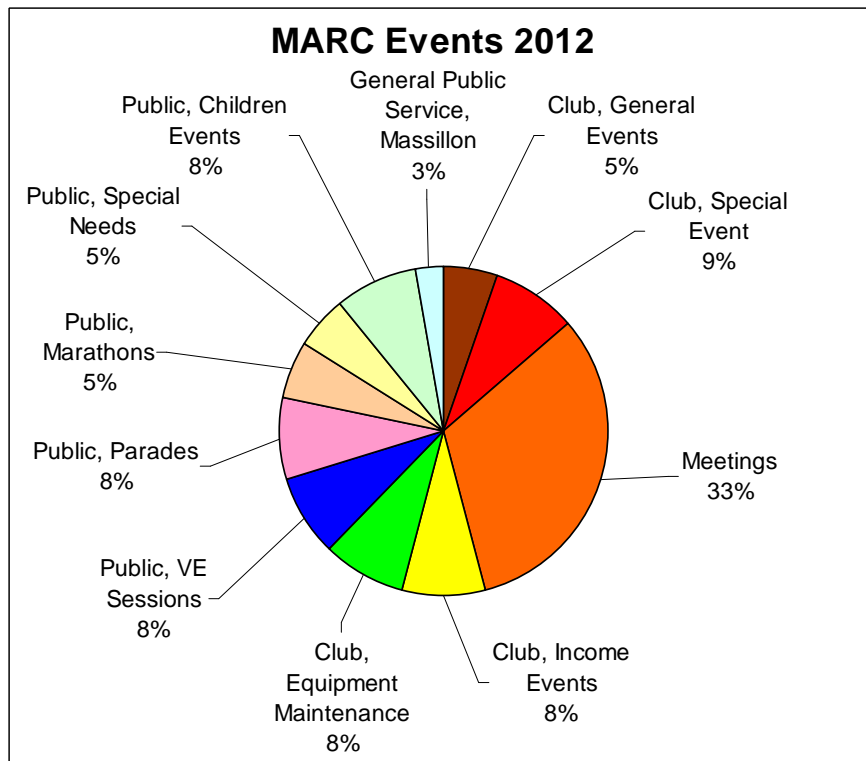

ARRL NEWS

IARU Welcomes Two New Member Societies

Earlier this year, the International Amateur Radio Union (IARU) notified its Member Societies that two new national Amateur Radio organizations wished to join the IARU and would need to be voted in: the Federation of Radio Sport of Azerbaijan (FRSA) and the St Vincent and the Grenadines Amateur Radio Club (SVGARC). Ballots from all the Member Societies that responded were counted on November 1.



Based in Baku, Azerbaijan, the FRSA was formally organized on December 30, 2001. There are 50 licensed members of the FRSA out of a total amateur population of approximately 50 in Azerbaijan. The SVGARC is based in St Vincent, St Vincent and the Grenadines and was formally organized in 1951. There are 21 licensed members of the SVGARC, out of a total amateur population of approximately 134 in the country. Both organizations have confirmed to the IARU that they have the ability to meet financial obligations as a member of the IARU, are legally able to act in the furtherance of IARU objectives within their respective countries and will adhere to the Constitutions of both the IARU and its respective Regional Organization.

In order for a new national organization to gain IARU membership, there must be 53 affirmative votes from current IARU Member Societies. The Federation of Radio Sport of Azerbaijan received 60 affirmative votes and the St Vincent and the Grenadines Amateur Radio Club received 61. All Member Societies that voted did so in favor of admitting these national organizations to the IARU. There are now more than 160 IARU Member Societies.

ARRL Letter 12-13-12

USPS rates increase later this month, yet again!

The cost of sending a 1-ounce letter in the US will rise a penny, to 46 cents, as of Jan. 27. Postcard stamps also go up one cent, to 33 cents. Rates also increase for Priority Mail & other services (including cost of mailing magazines), subject to final approval by the Postal Regulatory Commission.

USPS will also introduce a Forever Stamp for international postage, at a new standard rate of \$1.10/ounce for all overseas destinations. More info at <http://pc.usps.com>. This via the CQ Newsroom (Ye Ed had but forgot).

ARRL Files Petition for Rulemaking with FCC to Create New MF Band at 472-479 kHz

At the 2012 World Radiocommunication Conference (WRC-12), delegates approved Agenda Item 1.23: a 7-kilohertzwide secondary allocation between 472-479 kHz for the Amateur Radio Service, with a power limit of 5 W EIRP (or 1 W EIRP, depending on location). Before this portion of spectrum is made available to radio amateurs in the US, the FCC must first approve its use and amend its rules to reflect the change. As such, the ARRL filed a Petition for Rulemaking on November 29, asking the FCC to amend Sections 2 and 97 of its rules and create a domestic Amateur Radio allocation at 472-479 kHz, conforming to the allocation status and limitations set forth in the international Radio Regulations. article in

How Do You Choose an Antenna Analyzer?

A reader recently e-mailed me:

"In the past you told me you started with the Autek RF-1, and later moved to the Palstar ZM-30. I am finally getting around to thinking about purchasing an antenna analyzer, but I am stumped by the choices. In order of increasing purchase price this is what I've turned up:

- * Autek RF-1 - \$139.95
- * Autek RF-5 - \$229.95
- * Rig Expert AA-54 \$340.00
- * Palstar ZM-30 \$399.99
- * W4RT Electronics MiniVNA \$399.99
- * Rig Expert AA-230PRO \$690.00
- * Timewave Technology TZ-900S \$899.99

"How does one decide? Where does one go to find out the differences? Other than asking a fellow ham, how does one find out which one is the best antenna analyzer without paying an arm and a leg (unless the feature(s) so purchased are deemed worth the cost)?"

"Thanks! 73"

When I replied, I noted that he had actually missed several other good choices:

- * Autek VA1 \$199.
- * MFJ 259B - \$240.
- * YouKits FG-01 \$250.
- * Comet CAA500 \$450.

The Autek VA1 is actually the antenna analyzer that I first purchased. The MFJ 259B is arguably the most popular antenna analyzer on the market. MFJ has several other models with different feature sets. The YouKits FG-01 is a very cute, little analyzer with a small graphical display. It is made in China and sold in the U.S. by TenTec.

So, how do you choose just one from this list? Well, I think the first thing that you have to ask yourself is how you're going to use the analyzer. If all you're going to do is to check the SWR of your HF dipoles, then buy the Autek RF-1. Its the least expensive

unit, is reasonably accurate, and is small and lightweight, making it easy to use outside where your antennas are located.

If you want to do some more serious frequency analysis, then you should be looking at the W4RT miniVNA or, if you have more cash, the Timewave TZ-900s. These instruments can help you do a lot more in-depth analysis of your antenna system. The software for the miniVNA, for example, will easily plot the SWR of a multi-band vertical antenna from 3 - 33 MHz.

Some antenna analyzers do more than just SWR. For example, what sold me first on the Autek VA1 and then on the Palstar was that they also measured reactance. So, you can use the antenna analyzer as an LC meter as well. Palstar also says that you can use the ZM-3 as a low-level signal source. While I have used my Palstar to measure inductance and capacitance, I have yet to use it as a signal source.

Next, you need to consider what bands you'll be using it on. Many antenna analyzers only cover the HF bands. That's a bummer if you like operating 6m, or like to experiment with VHF/UHF antennas. A friend of mine bought the Palstar antenna analyzer after talking to the company at Dayton. At the time, they said that they were planning to come out with a model that covered 6m, as well as the HF bands.

Unfortunately, they never did come out with a 6m version, and he was sorely disappointed. He ended up buying a miniVNA instead. The miniVNA can be used up to 170 MHz right out of the box, and up to 1.5 GHz with an optional extender.

Asking your fellow hams about the antenna analyzers they have is actually a good way to figure out what's best for you. If you ask nicely, they might even let you borrow their analyzers or come over and show you how it works on your antennas.

Reading the reviews on eHam is also a good way to gather information before making a purchase like this. You certainly have to take the reviews there with a grain of salt, but if several reviewers mention a particularly good or particularly bad feature of a product, then it's certainly something worth taking a hard look at.

If you're new to the hobby, starting out small and working your way up might be a good strategy. You could buy one of the less expensive models and get used to how they work, then sell it and make the leap to a more sophisticated unit. The way things are going, you should be able to sell your first antenna analyzer for at least 80% of what you paid for it.

The March 2012 QST contains an in-depth review of four analyzers (available online to ARRL members), including the Comet CAA-500, MFJ-266, RigExpert AA-54, and the Youkits FG-01. Each analyzer reviewed had various plusses and minuses. Even if the unit you are considering was not reviewed, the article provides a guide to the kinds of questions you should be asking as you go through the selection process.
