MARC Minutes June 5, 2015

President Ralph K8HSQ opened the meeting at 8:00 PM and after the Pledge of Allegiance, there was a role call, with 30 persons present. Ralph explained that the regular program for tonight had to be cancelled, but there would be a slide show of old-time pictures from past activities of MARC after the regular meeting.

Motion to accept last month's minutes:

Ralph asked if there were any corrections or additions to the May Secretary's report that was sent to all members via e-mail. No corrections being needed, Ralph then asked for a motion to accept the report.

Motion by Steve WD8MIJ, second by Mike WA8MKH. Motion passed.

Treasurers Report:

Gary, WC8W then gave a detailed financial report for the club. Motion to accept the report was made by Steve WD8MIJ and seconded by Jim WA8GXM. Motion passed.

VP Report by Terry, N8ATZ

Terry mentioned that there are flyers on the table from the Dayton ARA (RF Carrier) and the Lake Erie ARA if anyone wants to read them. Rex NX8G also brought in a copy of the National Contest journal, which will be available in the shack. Thank you Rex. The only hamfests that might be of interest to club members is the Breeze Shooter's hamfest in Butler, PA to be held Sunday, June 7. Terry reminded everyone that our Field day will be held June 27 & 28, and that later in the meeting we will firm up plans for that. Birthdays this month were Leonard KC8RPB, Randy KD8JM, Steve WD8MIJ and Carol KB8IMH. Perry W8AU mentioned that starting tonight at 8:00PM until tomorrow at 8:00 pm; the annual Museum Ships on the Air event will be held, with 102 entries. Perry provided several copies of the listing of ships, with frequencies and modes. The information is also available on Google. A good chance to collect some interesting QSO's. Wade WD8MIU mentioned that time is nearing for the annual Hall of Fame activities, with the Community Parade on July 26, and the Grand Parade on August 8. We will be needing volunteers to help with the activities, so if you are interested in helping, get in touch with either Wade or Terry. It was also mentioned that Field Day will conflict with the Buehler's Community Day activities on June 27, so we will not be able to participate in that event. Wade also mentioned that he was informed by Dave, KC8WVH that Field Day activities for Stark County will be announced on radio station WHBC which is good for another 100 ARRL points, and increases public awareness of club activities. Don W8DEA mentioned that George Matinides, W8AKU passed away, and that there is a lot of very nice equipment that will be sold. Person interested should contact Max LeBold WA8SHP. On a lighter note, Ralph K8HSQ announced that after trying to get his son to take the exams for 40 years, he finally took and passed all three of his license exams, and is now ADOPL. Congratulations to both!

Committee Reports:

Dan, Gary, Wade and Don gave a report about the fox hunt that was conducted after last month's meeting. All went well and everyone had a good time hunting for the fox. Gary WC8W and ThomasKC8ZEH was the first to find it. Congratulations to all those who participated in the mentoring program that led to the hunt, and many thanks to those who sponsored it and gave of their time. Now the club has to think of a good subject for next year's mentoring program. Rex NX8G reported that at the last VE session, 3 techs passed and 1 person upgraded to extra. Also, congratulations to Larry Korblum, one of last year's tech class graduates, who has upgraded to Extra class and to Nick Cook, KE8BHR this year's Tech Class Graduate, who passed his Tech Class License. We'll be listening for you on the air. Perry W8AU reported that while the formal CW classes are over, the members come in early on meeting night for impromptu sessions, and are up to about 7-1/2 WPM and making progress. Now, get on the air and give Perry, Steve and Fred some help on Sunday night net! Jim reported that the 443.675 repeater is on the air now, and cautioned that if you are the first to key it up after it has been sleeping for a long time, to give it a short pause before talking, so your conversation won't miss the first few words. After that, there is no need for a pause. Quite a bit of conversation followed regarding the behavior of the new Fusion system during ID as well as what could be causing the noise that people have been intermittently hearing on the 147.18 repeater. Examination of the cabling etc. hasn't turned up any smoking gun yet. Mike WA8MKH expressed concern that the repeater's antenna is getting old, and could be causing problems, and that replacement is very expensive.

Ralph mentioned again that applications for the Senior Center area at the table, and remarked that it would be good PR for the club for members to join.

Old Business:

Mike WA8MKH reported that there has been no additional information about the Swiss Festival, since the festival committee hasn't solidified plans yet.

Perry W8AU reported that we have reached agreement with the Park Board regarding fees for the use of the center, and while they involve modest increases, the club will be able to accommodate it without significant problems. Many thanks to all who dealt with this problem. If we would have had to deal with significant increases in fees, it would have created a serious problem for the club. A good bit of discussion followed about picking another site for field day. Perry has visited a few places, and would like others to get involved with site selection so that selection is based on several different opinions and views.

Terry N8ATZ gave some good news about tables for the hamfest. Our long-time provider, while out of the business, still has agreed to supply tables for us, which simplifies planning, and will most likely save the club money if we were forced to find another provider.

New Business:

Ted K8TWA presented the idea of purchasing copies of the ARRL license training manuals for loan to prospective students. After some discussion, Jim WA8GXM made a motion to purchase a set of the manuals. Motion seconded by Gene W8KXR. Motion passed.

Perry W8AU offered a computer video projector to the club for \$40, explaining that the club needs one for banquets, training sessions, programs etc. Motion was made to buy the projector, and seconded by Jim WA8GXM. Motion passed.

Terry noted that the next meeting is scheduled for July 3rd, and that many businesses as well as individuals might be involved with other activities. It was decided to see if the Senior Center would be available on July 10th, and if so, an e-mail will be sent to all club members informing them of the change.

Field Day Plans:

Terry went over plans for field day, assigning various responsibilities and making sure that most of the details for the event will be covered. The topics of trailer, CW station, various food items etc. were covered and assigned. Plans seemed to be falling into place well, and any last-minute items can be handled the morning of setup.

50:50 Raffle: The 50-50 was won by Perry W8AU, who donated the proceeds back to the club.

With business concluded, Ralph closed the meeting and reminded everyone to stay around for the program.

After a short break for refreshments, a projector was set up and pictures of MARC activities from past years were shown. Being a fairly new member, it was interesting, sometimes humorous, and educational to see the many pictures from the past, with comments from the peanut gallery. It was also observed that apparently being close to radio gear causes ones hair to lighten considerably, since most of the people in the old pictures had darker hair, and now are mostly grey.

Dayton was a Blast this Year

A couple of weeks ago, I made my annual pilgrimage to Dayton for the 2015 Hamvention. This year, I had even more fun than in the past, and that's saying a lot.

I started Dayton 2015 on Thursday by attending the QRP-ARCI's Four Days in May (<http://www.qrparci.org/fdim/>) seminar. George Dobbs, G3RJV, gave a very nice talk that not only talked about circuits, but also the people he's met over the years and the places he's been. Paul, M0XPD, gave an interesting talk on crystal filters and using an Arduino to control a QRP rig. The final talk, by Glen, KW5GP, was also about using an Arduino to control a QRP rig. Other talks covered transmission lines and SWR and adventures in PCB making. I learned something in every single one.

That evening, I participated in Vendor's Night. I sold quite a few copies of my CW Geek's Guide to Having Fun with Morse Code and gave out quite a few "I'm a CW Geek" buttons and "Hams Obey Ohm's Law" stickers.

Friday and Saturday were all about the Hamvention. As far as new products go, there were a couple of interesting announcements. Elecraft introduced the K3S, an updated and upgraded K3 HF Transceiver, and FlexRadio introduced the Maestro, a "front end" with knobs, dials, and LCD screen for their software-driven radios. Apparently, hams like knobs and dials after all.

It seemed to me that there were more people at this year's Hamvention. There were certainly more sellers out in the flea market. And deals were to be had. I picked up a Bencher BY-1 for only \$50. I also found a Hallicrafters HA-1 T.O. Keyer (http://www.ai4fr.com/main/page_ham_radio_hallicrafters_ha1.html), which I believe to be the first commercially-available electronic keyer. Produced in the 1960s, it uses tubes to generate dots and dashes.

Dayton usually has a great lineup of forums, but aside from perhaps the TAPR forum, the Antennas forum, and maybe the ATV forum, none of them really called to me. Also, I was really busy talking to people I know, meeting readers, and trying to get the dealers to carry my books, so I didn't get to a single one.

Being the CW geek that I am, I'm hoping to hold a CW forum at next year's Hamvention. I've already contacted the forum people, and while they haven't committed to giving me time, I did get a very positive response. C U THR?

Letters to Members of Congress Offer Biggest Boost to Amateur Radio Parity Act

ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN, has told Section Managers that, while promotion and positive publicity about the Amateur Radio Parity Act (H.R. 1301) are always helpful, the most useful action radio amateurs can take is to contact their members of Congress, urging them to sign on as cosponsors. As of June 9, [72 members](#) of the US House in both parties were listed as cosponsors of the proposed legislation, which would direct the FCC to extend its rules relating to reasonable accommodation of Amateur Service communications to private land-use restrictions. Craigie told the SMs that the grassroots campaign supporting H.R. 1301 needs more letters.

"We have been told quite bluntly by some congressional offices that they want letters from constituents -- that they will be interested in what the ARRL has to say only if they know that voters care about this issue," Craigie said in urging Section Managers to rally the troops. "Why should the congressman care, they ask, if the voters don't? There are tens of thousands of ARRL members who have not written yet. You can do a lot to persuade them to write, because they know you."

Craigie cited the case of US Rep John Carney of Delaware, who signed on as an H.R. 1301 cosponsor this week. Delaware Section Manager Bill Duveneck, KB3KYH, told her that ARRL members have been appealing to the state's lone Member of Congress to support the bill.

"Late last month, ARRL representatives visited Congressman Carney's Washington office and delivered a stack of approximately 50 constituent letters," Craigie recounted. "That, in addition to the in-state contacts, got the congressman's attention, and he agreed to cosponsor."

Craigie pointed out that the 50 letters were all the more impressive in the case of tiny Delaware, where there are fewer than 500 ARRL members. "Do the math!" she said. "If we could get a similar percentage of ARRL members in additional districts to write their members of Congress, the bill's progress would accelerate. Local in-district contacts plus concentrated letter-writing efforts add up to co-sponsorship. Here's to Delaware and all the other districts whose ARRL members are getting the job done for H.R. 1301."

Members are encouraged to contact their member of Congress by writing personalized, signed letters on paper,

based on the sample letter, available on the [ARRL H.R. 1301](#) web page. Letters should go to ARRL Headquarters for hand delivery to the appropriate House members. Send letters to ARRL, ATTN H.R. 1301 Grassroots Campaign, 225 Main St, Newington CT 06111.

Sending these letters via ARRL allows Headquarters staff to keep track of how many communications are going to which congressional districts. But more important, Craigie pointed out, when letters are delivered to the Hill in person, there's an opportunity to speak with congressional staffers. "The stack of letters is proof that voters care about the bill," she said. "We have to convince the staff people, so they'll advise the Member of Congress to cosponsor. That's how it works on Capitol Hill."

Craigie further urged Section Managers to mention the bill when they speak at conventions and club meetings. Craigie also encouraged members whose US House member already has signed on to H.R. 1301 as a cosponsor to call, write, or e-mail a message of appreciation. "Good manners, good strategy," she said.

The League is working on having a US Senate version of H.R. 1301 introduced.

Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF (SK)

A well-known voice in the Amateur Radio news media has gone silent.

Bill Pasternak, WA6ITF, of Santa Clarita, California, died June 11 following a period of ill health. He was 73. Pasternak was co-founder (with Jim Hendershot, WA6VQP) of Amateur Radio

Newsline(tm) (formerly The Westlink Report) ham radio news webcast and a frequent presence at Amateur Radio conventions. Pasternak served as Newsline's managing editor and occasional newscaster for the program. Even while hospitalized earlier this year, he kept his ear to the ground for news from the Amateur Radio community, so he could pass it along to those who had taken over Newsline during his illness - discovered after he broke two ribs in a fall. ARRL Rocky Mountain Division Director Brian Milesosky, N5ZGT, got acquainted with Pasternak at the Albuquerque hamfest and in 1997 was named Newsline's "Young Ham of the Year" (YHOTY).

"An incredible man, ham, and one of Amateur Radio's too-few giants, who woke up every day to make the hobby better for everyone, especially its legacy - youth," Mileschosky said. "I've enjoyed the energy he put into keeping hams informed via Newsline, and have been honored to give back to his Newsline Young Ham of the Year Award program, since being asked by him to sit on its judging panel well over a decade ago."

ARRL Public Relations Committee Chair Katie Allen, WY7YL, said Pasternak would be missed by those within and outside the Amateur Radio community. "He truly was one of the good ones," she remarked on Pasternak's Facebook page. "Thank you for sharing your light with us, Bill."

A Brooklyn, New York, native, Pasternak became a radio amateur in 1959 as WA2HVK and once was very active on 6 meters. "I love the hands-on approach to ham radio and built my very first transmitter using parts salvaged from an old Dumont television set," Pasternak recounted in an online biography. "It was a modification of a design by Bill Orr, W6SAI, published in his famous Novice and Technician Handbook. A crystal-controlled, low-power 6 meter AM transmitter that doubled in the final, was screen grid modulated, and put out almost no output power."

He eventually got into broadcasting and made his career in television engineering and production. He retired as a broadcast engineer with KTTV in Los Angeles in 2012 but continued as a broadcasting consultant.

Pasternak was the spark plug behind the all-volunteer Amateur Radio Newsline bulletin - which was relayed on repeaters around the US and elsewhere - as well as the creator and administrator of the annual YHOTY. He was the author of three books and served as a writer/producer on several educational films and videos, including the award-winning "Amateur Radio Today." In earlier years, he wrote the "Looking West" column for 73 Amateur Radio Today Magazine for 26 years and penned a "VHF, FM and Repeater" column for WorldRadio. He also contributed to broadcast trade publications as well as to CQ.

In addition to the ARRL, Pasternak belonged to the Radio Club of America and the Quarter

Century Wireless Association. He also enjoyed flying, including stunts getting on the air from thousands of feet up.

He was the only person ever chosen to receive the Dayton Hamvention Special Achievement Award (1981) and Radio Amateur of the Year Award (1989). In 1995, the League presented him with an ARRL National Certificate of Merit in recognition of his contributions to the "furtherance of the goals of the Amateur Radio Service."

Survivors include his wife of 43 years, Sharon, KD6EPW.
