The definition of a Club is 1.) To gather or combine, 2.) To contribute for a joint or common purpose. **Let's be a Club!**

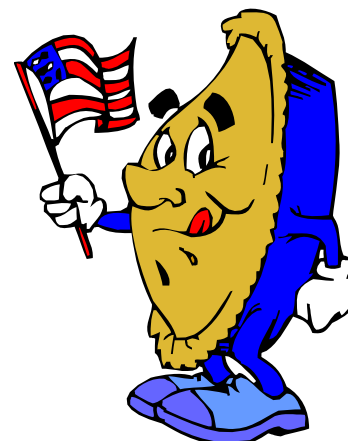

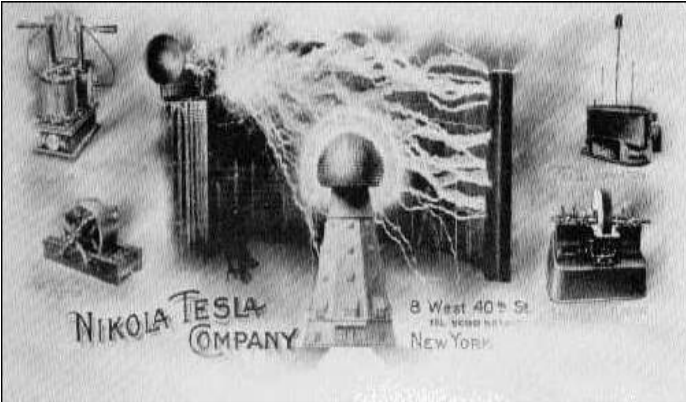

FUN FACTS



As early as 1892, Nikola Tesla created a basic design for radio. On November 8, 1898 he patented a radio controlled robot-boat. Tesla used this boat which was controlled by radio waves in the Electrical Exhibition in 1898, Madison Square Garden.

Tesla's robot-boat was constructed with an antenna, which transmitted the radio waves coming from the command post where Tesla was standing. Those radio waves were received by a radio sensitive device called coherer, which transmitted the radio waves into mechanical movements of the propellers on the boat.

Tesla changed the boat's direction, with manually operated controls on the command post. Since this was the first application of radio waves, it made front page news, in America, at that time.

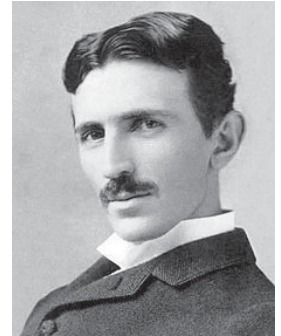
Most of us, think of Guglielmo Marconi as the father of radio, and Tesla is unknown for his work in radio. Marconi claimed all the first patents for radio,

something originally developed by Tesla. Nikola Tesla tried to prove that he was the creator of radio but it wasn't until 1943, where Marconi's patents were deemed invalid; however, people still have no idea about Tesla's work with radio.

BACKGROUND: NIKOLA TESLA (thanks to Wikipedia)

Nikola Tesla (Serbian: "8;>;0 "5A;0; 10 July 1856 – 7 January 1943) was an inventor, mechanical engineer, and electrical engineer. He was an important contributor to the birth of commercial electricity, and is best known for his many revolutionary developments in the field of electromagnetism in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Tesla's patents and theoretical work formed the basis of modern alternating current (AC) electric power systems, including the polyphase system of electrical distribution and the AC motor. This work helped usher in the Second Industrial Revolution.



Born an ethnic Serb in the village of Smiljan (now part of Gospi), in the Croatian Military Frontier of the Austrian Empire (modern-day Croatia), Tesla was a subject of the Austrian Empire by birth and later became an American citizen. Because of his 1894 demonstration of wireless communication through radio and as the eventual victor in the "War of Currents", he was widely respected as one of the greatest electrical engineers who worked in America. He pioneered modern electrical engineering and many of his discoveries were of groundbreaking importance. In the United States during this time, Tesla's fame rivaled that of any other inventor or scientist in history or popular culture. Tesla demonstrated wireless energy transfer to power electronic devices as early as 1893, and aspired to intercontinental wireless transmission of industrial power in his unfinished Wardenclyffe Tower project.

Because of his eccentric personality and his seemingly unbelievable and sometimes bizarre claims about possible scientific and technological developments, Tesla was ultimately ostracized and regarded as a mad scientist by many late in his life. Tesla died with little money at the age of 86 in a hotel suite in New York City.

The SI unit measuring magnetic field **B** (also referred to as the *magnetic flux density* and *magnetic induction*), the tesla, was named in his honor (at the CGPM, Paris, 1960).

We will begin setting up no later than 9 a.m. and demonstrate almost all of our operating capabilities for the general public during the period from Noon until 4 p.m. This will include:

1. Ham-TV pickup of our remote camera setups,
2. Winlink connection to the Internet,
3. Traffic Handling capabilities, with ARRL message blanks for documentation,
4. HF/VHF/UHF Emergency Repeater interfacing,
5. HF SSB & CW comms for regional and national coverage.
6. MARS affiliation. (signs only, as there are no MARS nets occurring during our display period)
7. Satellite communications.
8. And maybe even Radio Direction finding. (Fox hunting?)

So those of you proficient in each of these modes please get ready to "show off" your talents. This may require bringing some of your own gear along.

We will also have, for the kids, a CW code-test table set up for boys and girls to qualify sending SOS or their name, or whatever...and receive a "Junior Radio Operator" award. (kids are our future!)

Not only will we be scrutinized by the public, but also by most of the agencies participating, who may have their own communications methods. (But nowhere as varied as what we have). In view of this, we will have to have a somewhat "polished" image, despite not having "uniforms" as others will have. Hence the need for some standardization of dress. Regarding the public service event we spoke about at the meeting.

It's called the COOL Day Event in Canton. COOL stands for Community Outreach Of Love. Local area churches organize and provide volunteers to clean up and revitalize rundown neighborhoods. Last year they had nearly 1,200 volunteers. Providing coordination for this many volunteers is a difficult task without good communications. During last years event, we used 5 radio volunteers to coordinate needed supplies with block coordinators and keep a watchful eye on the weather.

This years event will be very similar but with up to 5,000 volunteers. The location will be the Hartford School Neighborhood in Canton's South East side.

They have once again asked if ham radio operators could provide communications support to the event.

The Stark Co ARES will provide the use of our Communications Trailer as a Net Control Center. Communications will take place using both Simplex and the 147.12 Mhz ARES Repeater.

The event is on Saturday, June 4th and will run from

8:00 AM until about 3:00 PM.

So far I have secured 4 volunteers from the Massillon ARC. More would be possible but they are staffing a Community Safety Day Demonstration event at Clay's Park that is using up most of the clubs resources.

I am hoping for some additional help from both the Alliance and Canton ARC. Any assistance you can provide would be greatly appreciated.

The event Communications Coordinators are Dale (KB8LWP) and Cathy (KC8EUC) Storey. Both are members of one of the participating churches.

I am assisting them in providing communications volunteers.

SB QST ARL ARLB014 ARRLB014 **Senate “Companion” Bill to HR 607 Avoids Impacting Amateur Spectrum**

On Thursday, May 19, Senators Joe Lieberman (ID-CT) and John McCain (R-AZ) introduced S 1040 — The Broadband for First Responders Act of 2011 — in the Senate. While it has a similar objective to HR 607 — introduced in February by Representative Peter King (R-NY-3) — this Senate bill, unlike HR 607, does not call for auctioning any portions of Amateur Radio spectrum. Both bills call for the allocation of the so-called “D block” of spectrum, 758-763 and 788-793 MHz, to facilitate the development of a public safety broadband network.

On learning in February that a Senate version of HR 607 was being drafted, ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ, met with staff members of the Senate’s Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee who were working on the bill to share the ARRL’s concerns with regard to HR 607. “They seemed very receptive to our argument and appreciative of the public service contributions of radio amateurs,” Sumner said. “It is gratifying to see that S 1040 avoids impacting our spectrum allocations.”

Sumner explained that while some media reports are referring to S 1040 as “the Senate version of HR 607,” it is important that radio amateurs not oppose S 1040: “There is no reason for us to do so. We support the creation of an interoperable broadband network for first responders. Other than to oppose any method that would impact amateur spectrum use, we do not support one method over another of achieving that objective. We only oppose one aspect of HR 607, not the entire bill.”

S 1040 has been referred to the Senate Committee on Science, Commerce, and Transportation, chaired by Senator Jay Rockefeller (D-WV). Senator Rockefeller earlier introduced his own bill, S 28, to address the same general topic. Neither Senate bill would impact amateur spectrum.

FEMA Administrator Calls Amateur Radio “The Last Line of Defense”

In an [FCC forum](#) on earthquake communications preparedness, Federal Emergency Management Agency ([FEMA](#)) Administrator Craig Fugate described the Amateur Radio operator as “the ultimate backup, the originators of what we call social media.” The forum—held May 3 at FCC Headquarters in Washington, DC—brought together officials from the White House, the Department of Homeland Security ([DHS](#)), the United States Geological Survey ([USGS](#)), FEMA, the FCC and the private sector. Fugate and FCC Bureau of Public Safety and Homeland Security Chief Jamie Barnett gave the opening remarks.

In an earthquake communications preparedness forum sponsored by the FCC, FEMA Administrator Craig Fugate praised Amateur Radio, saying “...when you need Amateur Radio, you really need it.”

Later in the forum, Fugate spoke more on Amateur Radio. “During the initial communications out of Haiti, volunteers using assigned frequencies that they are allocated, their own equipment, their own money, nobody pays them, were the first ones oftentimes getting word out in the critical first hours and first days as the rest of the systems came back up,” he told the forum. “I think that there is a tendency because we have done so much to build infrastructure and resiliency in all our other systems, we have tended to dismiss that role ‘When Everything Else Fails.’ Amateur Radio oftentimes is our last line of defense.”

Fugate said that he thinks “we get so sophisticated and we have gotten so used to the reliability and resilience in our wireless and wired and our broadcast industry and all of our public safety communications, that we can never fathom that they’ll fail. They do. They have. They will. I think a strong Amateur Radio community [needs to be] plugged into these plans. Yes, most of the time they’re going to be bored, because a lot of the time, there’s not a lot they’re going to be doing that other people aren’t doing with Twitter and Facebook and everything else. But when you need Amateur Radio, you really need them.”
