... INTERNET SPEED TEST ...

A month or so ago I began to notice my internet connection seemed to be running slower than normal. It really showed up when I was doing normal maintenance to the club's website as this requires uploading large amounts of data to the web host servers.

After a week or so of this nagging problem I finally decided to talk to my high speed service, Massillon Cable TV. Because I have a home office, I subscribe to their Mega-Service which provides a download speed of about 6 Mbps (Mega Bits Per Second) under idea conditions.

Their IT department answered quickly and first they had a look at my cable modem via a remote connection. They indicated no problems with the modem and asked me if I had been using a wireless router. I do and they asked me to bypass it and connect the computer directly to the cable modem. Once this was done they asked me to check my internet connection speed by going to a speed test website that they recommend. I did as requested and the result was an average connect speed of 5.8 Mbps. Checking a few websites I realized the speed was back up to normal.

It turned out that my wireless router was the culprit. I replaced it and problem solved. You might want to check your speed by using this website. It will tell you your upload and download speed as well as identify your internet service provider. Point your browser to www.speedtest.net Click on begin test and in a minute or so you will see your results.

With my new router I now get a consistent download speed of 5.97 Mbps with upload speeds of about 0.58 Mbps which is just what I pay for !

... NEW ARRL EC COURSE ...

The ARRL has announced that they are now ready to re-launch their Field Classes and Exams for the newly revised "Introduction to Emergency Communications" course.

The printed course transcript is now available from the ARRL store and Field Exams for the new course have finally been released and should be available soon. Some requirements have changed in order to have the exams available at VE Test sessions. I hope to work with our new VE Coordinator John Kalafice, W0OZZ to offer these new exams a upcoming test sessions. I'll let you know when this is completed in future columns.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank MARC members who helped to restore the antenna system on the roof of the Senior Center. Climber; Jim WA8GXM, Helpers: Perry W8AU, Wade WD8MIU, Mike KD8ENV, Gary WC8W, and Rick Fligor KD8NYZ. This brings (we hope!) an end to almost two years of trying to get the antennas fixed. A new, 2 inch mast pipe and trust bearing was installed to try to keep the big antenna from turning in the rotor, thus breaking off the coax when the antenna reaches it's maximum turning radius. We theorized that the old 1 1/4 mast pipe was just too small to get a good "bite" on the mast pipe mounted on the rotor and just twisted off when the wind blew. We're keeping our fingers crossed that this works ! If I missed anyone on the list, I'm sorry !

TECHNICIAN CLASSES TO START

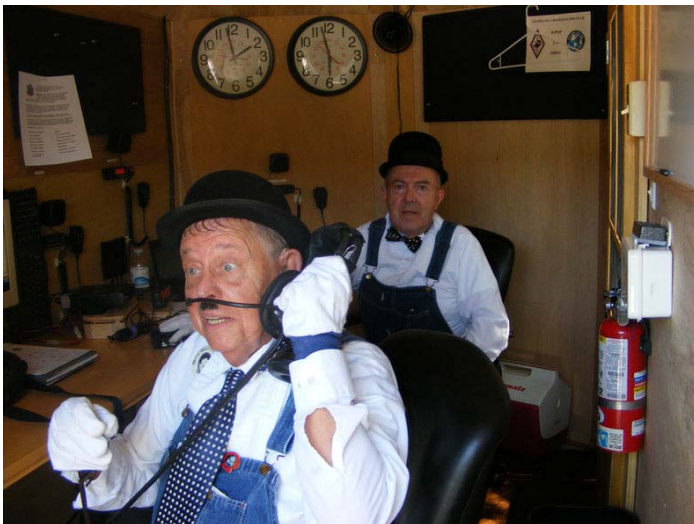

It's Back to School Time...for Ham Radio, too!

As I write this, it's about 85 degrees, and I'm sitting on the patio of a cottage overlooking Elk Lake in northern Michigan. This idyllic spot is about as far away from school as you can get. And yet, in less than a month, kids will be back in school, and if kids are going to be back in school, why not ham radio operators?

The fall is a good time to begin teaching a new group of Technicians. I favor the "Tech in a Day" or "Ham Cram" type of class. This type of class focuses on teaching students the answers to questions on the test rather than the material itself.

There's a lot of controversy about this, and many decry this method of teaching, but I think the best way to learn about ham radio is by actually doing it, and you can't do if you don't have a license. Besides, how much more instruction will students actually get in a more traditional eight-week or ten-week course, maybe 16 hours? Will those 16 hours make that much of a difference?

For the sake of argument, let's say that you've decided to offer a one-day Tech class. Now what? Well, the first thing you have to do is to find a place to teach it. Possible sites include your local public library, a township hall, a community college, perhaps even your church.

Now that you have the place, you need to find some students. Your local emergency-management group would be a good place to start. Also, make sure a notice gets published in your amateur radio club's newsletter. Chances are most of the subscribers already have licenses, but they may have friends or relatives who would be interested. Also, make sure the class gets listed in the upcoming events section of local newspapers or magazines.

Once people start signing up, you should suggest that they either purchase a study guide or download my free study guide (www.kb6nu.com/tech-manual). Because I use my study guide when teaching the class, I always advise them to get a copy, but if you'll be using other materials, then your advice may differ.

I counsel the students to read through my study guide a few times and take some online practice tests before coming to class. That will make them familiar with the material, especially areas they may be weak in or have questions about. By bringing those questions to class, we can address those areas in a little more depth, which will, hopefully, give them the help they need to pass the test.

The class itself is six hours long, running from 9am to 3pm, at which time we give them the test. This is not a lot of time for the amount of material I have to cover, so I move along at a pretty brisk pace. I concentrate on giving them the answers, but with enough context to that it all makes sense.

OK, let's say your class was wildly successful, and you now have a group of newly-minted Techs. What do you do now?

Well, you might consider offering some short sessions on what ham radio operators do—Ham Radio 101, so to speak. The topics could include how to choose your first radio, the basics of FM repeater and net operation, and building your first antenna (say a 2m ground plane). They'll be more enthusiastic about these classes now that they actually have a license.

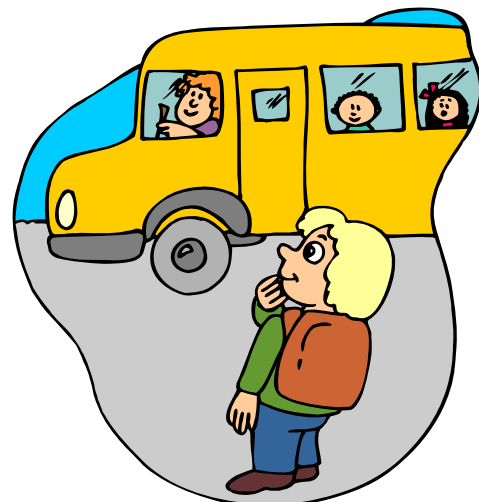
It might also be a good idea to schedule a General Class license course for sometime shortly after the Tech class. This will encourage them to upgrade while they are enthusiastic about the hobby.

For hams throughout the State of Ohio this contest presents an opportunity to visit and enjoy the amenities offered by the seventy-six beautiful State Parks here in Ohio. You can spend the day or even spend the weekend at the park of your choice. No matter whether you are camping or staying at one of the outstanding lodges or resorts you will find that the parks are one of Ohio's greatest assets.

This contest places a premium on working stations at the State Parks. That means that it is critical to have as many parks activated as possible. The challenge for Ohio stations will be to work HF in the 50 to 300 mile range. Contacts can be made with any mode on the HF and VHF bands: 80, 40, 20, 15, 10, 6 and 2 meters and all contacts have the same point value. This is a great chance to try something new, like an NVIS antenna or two meter SSB.

Individuals and clubs can operate high or low power park stations and there is a special award for the club that activates the greatest number of parks! Non-park stations in Ohio as well as outside of Ohio can also compete with each other.

NHC Issues Hurricane Watch for Portions of North Carolina; ARRL Establishes Hurricane Irene Website

As Hurricane Irene — currently a Category 3 storm — approaches the US, the National Hurricane Center (NHC) has issued a hurricane watch earlier this morning for regions north of Surf City, North Carolina to the North Carolina-Virginia border, including the Pamlico, Albemarle and Currituck Sounds. A tropical storm watch is also in effect for north of Edisto Beach, South Carolina to Surf City, North Carolina.

In anticipation of Irene's expected landfall in North Carolina, the ARRL HQ Emergency Response Team (HQERT) has established a website to keep amateurs informed of the latest developments. This website will also provide links to the NHC, WX4NHC — the Amateur Radio station at the NHC — the Hurricane Watch Net and the Voice over Internet Protocol Weather Net, where radio amateurs can send in their reports. The HQERT will also be monitoring various nets and providing support to the affected Field Organizations beginning on Friday, August 26 from W1AW, the Hiram Percy Maxim Memorial Station.

The NHC is predicting that it will be issuing hurricane warnings later on Thursday for those areas already covered by the hurricane watch, and is expected to extend the hurricane watch northward along the Mid-Atlantic coast, as well. The NHC advises residents in the Mid-Atlantic States and New England to monitor Irene's progress in anticipation of possible hurricane watches or warnings

At the Workbench: Heathkit Returns to the Kit Business

A notice on the Heathkit website announces



that the venerable kit manufacturer, well-known to all Amateur Radio operators of a certain age, will be reentering the kit business in late August. The notice states, in part: "Heathkit will debut their new line of Do

-it-Yourself kits for common around-the-house items. The first kit will be a Garage Parking Assistant (GPA). The Garage Parking Assistant kit lets you build your own system that uses ultrasonic sound waves to locate your car as it enters the garage. The system signals to the driver using LED lights mounted on the wall when the car is detected and in the perfect spot for parking.

Heathkit intends to offer more unique kits to build and wants input from builders on what type of kits to offer. Although there is no indication that Heathkit intends on re-entering the Amateur Radio market. Kitbuilders can enter their suggestion through their website using the Contact Us email.

Heathkit is very old company that started as an aircraft company in 1912. It has changed hands many times since then and had several decades as a kitbuilder company. Heathkit left the business in 1992. The kit building business started out as a kitbuilder only then later on offered non-kit type equipment until exiting the business in 1992. Interesting !

Peter Dahl, K0BIT (SK)

Peter Dahl, K0BIT, of El Paso, Texas, passed away August 15 of Parkinson's disease. He was 71. In 2007 after more than 40 years, he closed his company — the Peter W. Dahl Company — citing health reasons. "I want to thank everyone for their business throughout the years," Dahl told the ARRL upon his retirement. "I have enjoyed making each Amateur Radio transformer.



Dahl was still a student at University of Minnesota when he founded the Peter Dahl Company that manufactured custom transformers for Amateur Radio as well as commercial applications.

Mr. Dahl's memorial service was held in Texas on August 19th.
